







New online Community Directory the perfect way to connect

The launch of a new online Community Directory is set to change how residents connect with local community groups, organisations and other services across our region.

The one-stop website is free to use, and contains contact information for local groups, organisations and services – all in the one convenient location.

The Community Directory aims to link locals with the services and groups they need, while also making it easier for groups and organisations to share their information with the wider community.

Community groups and organisations simply create an account to log in, before adding their information and submitting it for approval. Listings can be updated at any time.

The community can then search for groups based on category – including arts, community groups, early education, employment, financial and legal aid, sports and recreation and youth to name a few.

Many groups, including Mildura Ballet and Dance Guild (pictured) have already listed, and organisations are encouraged to add and update their details.

Maintaining and repairing our region's footpath network, shared paths and kerb and channel is no mean feat.

Hundreds of kilometres of these vital community assets wind their way through the Mildura Rural City Council area. While we can often take them for granted, infrastructure like this is what helps to make our towns safe, practical and appealing places to live, visit and exercise.

Council has allocated more than \$1.5 million for work on local footpaths, shared paths and kerb and channel in the 2022-23 Financial Year.

This includes a range of projects to construct new infrastructure or replace damaged sections which are no longer fit for purpose or at end of life.

Our teams also respond regularly to reports of damage and requests for safety repairs.

Some of the projects planned over the coming twelve months include:

- Renewal of kerb & channel at Box Street, Merbein (between Main Avenue and Smith Street)
- Renewal of kerb & channel in front of Red Cliffs Maternal and Child Health Centre (37 Guava Street)
- Renewal of kerb & channel at 91 Thirteenth Street, Mildura
- Renewal of footpath in front of Merbein P10 College (Commercial Street, Merbein)
- New footpath from 651-671 Koorlong Avenue, Irymple
- New footpath, kerb & channel and road widening at 109 Riverside Avenue, Mildura

- 101km of unsealed bluestone shared paths

Register on Council's new procurement system


Mildura Rural City Council is urging local businesses to register on its new procurement platform - VendorPanel.

Getting better rest

Baby Sleep and Settling program supporting local families

Angela Kerr says she 'felt like a walking zombie' in the early weeks of life as a new mum.

The Mildura resident's son Hudson wasn't sleeping more than three hours overnight and Angela was willing to try anything to change that.

So, when Angela learned about Council's free Baby Sleep and Settling program she didn't hesitate to book a consult.

"It was so valuable to have someone come to the house and help me identify the individual sleep signs of my child, as each child is different," Angela said.

"As a teacher, I know each child needs to be treated as an individual because no two children are alike. Therefore, having a personalised approach was a game-changer."

A qualified Maternal and Child Health Nurse calmly and gently guided Angela through various sleep and settling methods for her newborn, helped her identify Hudson's tired signs and explained the optimum awake periods for a baby of his age.

"The advice given came from a place of care and support, in a non-judgmental manner. I felt supported during the session and afterwards when I had questions or needed further guidance."

After implementing the techniques learned during the session, little Hudson went from sleeping 2-3 hours at a time to 7-8 hours, if not more!

"I feel like my old self again! I am a lot happier and a better mother because I'm not overtired each day," Angela said.

"Hudson is also a happier baby. Our quality of life has improved significantly."

"I am much more confident in my ability to settle my baby, no matter what challenges we may face in the future."

These conditions are in place to ensure the park is safe for all users to enjoy.





Heritage Study to protect historically significant sites

A major project to protect the history and cultural significance of our region is now underway.

Council is working with specialist consultants and a community-based reference group to undertake the Mildura Heritage Study (Part B, Stage 2).

We conduct heritage studies to ensure that buildings, streetscapes, trees and monuments of heritage significance are protected as the municipality changes or future developments are considered.

Based on these studies, we're able to propose changes and recommend sites for heritage overlay protection in the Mildura Planning Scheme.

The Mildura Heritage Study (Part B, Stage 2) will focus on 136 individual sites across the former Shire of Mildura and City of Mildura areas. These include residential, commercial, community and industrial places, landscape and military sites, archaeological places, trees and precincts, which were identified in an earlier stage of the project.

Among the sites to be reviewed are the Red Cliffs Swimming Pool (pictured, c.1950-60), Yelta saleyards, Werrimull Hotel and Merbein's avenue of palm trees on Third Street.

Laurie has worked with Council for almost 42 years - 36 of which have been based at the Mildura Landfill.

Back when Laurie started in the '80s, the Landfill entrance was at the corner of Ontario Avenue and Thirteenth Street. Laurie was originally the sole worker on site and people could dump anything and everything, free of charge. Things have changed significantly since then.

The introduction of recycling heralded a new era and more awareness about where our waste goes and its environmental impacts.

When waste disposal fees were introduced, Laurie set up a small hut near the Landfill entrance for people to pay their fees. He has seen thousands of customers come through the gates, operated loaders, excavators, compactors and also helped out with bin collections and on other Council works crews.

Laurie's contribution to waste management services was acknowledged in 2004 when the road leading into the Mildura Landfill was officially named Scherger Drive, in his honour.

Laurie continues to work full-time in his current role as Landfill Coordinator.

Weeding out weeds

This year has been wetter than usual so as the weather starts to warm up prickly and pesky weeds will pop up, causing chaos for green thumbs, gardeners, pets, and playing children.

The most common weeds that appear at this time of year include Caltrop (also known as Bindii and Puncture Weed) and Khaki Weed.

Fruit from Caltrop and Khaki Weed are easily picked up by the feet of animals, tyres from machinery, prams, lawn mowers, bicycles, gophers and rubber-soled shoes. Both weeds are classed as Restricted in the Mallee under the Catchment and Land Protection Act 1984.

It is important to control or remove these weeds before they set seed as this will reduce their impact in later years, prevent them from spreading and stop those nasty prickles from being a hazard to feet, pets, and bike tyres.

The best way to control Caltrop and Khaki Weed is to pull them by hand or chip with a shovel, starting from the outside of the patch and working inwards to minimise the chance of spreading.

The pulled plant should then be disposed of in your green food and garden organics bin.

Landowers are responsible for controlling weeds on nature strips and roadsides adjoining private land. Council is responsible for controlling weeds on Council-owned properties such as public parks and gardens and adjoining nature strips.

Controlling and maintaining weeds benefits all of us and Council recognises the important role residents play in caring for and maintaining their nature strips adjoining homes or businesses.

Council completes White Ribbon Australia Workplace re-accreditation

Mildura Rural City Council is proud to announce it has successfully completed the White Ribbon Australia Workplace Accreditation Program for a third consecutive time.

Council first gained White Ribbon accreditation in March

2016 and has since made great strides, both internally and in the community, to raise awareness about violence against women, family and gendered violence and how to prevent it.

The accreditation program, facilitated by community service organisation Communicare, involves a whole of organisation commitment to address gendered violence.

To achieve accreditation, organisations must meet 15 criteria under three standards to create a safer and more respectful workplace which is taking active steps to stop gendered violence. The program is internationally recognised and to date has reached more than 600,000 employees nationally.

Council has been a White Ribbon Accredited Workplace for six years straight. By maintaining White Ribbon Workplace Accreditation, Council staff have been equipped with the knowledge and resources to better understand what family and gendered violence is, how to identify it, and what they can do to prevent it.

Call to clean up unsightly land ahead of Fire Danger Period

Spring is in the air, and so is the start of the Fire Danger Period for our region.

The CFA declares an annual Fire Danger Period generally from October through to April, and it's important that everyone in our region does their part to prepare and reduce the risk of fire.

The district has seen significant rainfall this year, which has led to an increase in vegetation and therefore a higher fire risk when the weather heats up.

All property owners are required to keep their properties free from fire hazards including clearing properties of long vegetation, rubbish and unused materials.

Council Officers inspect properties throughout the municipality and issue compliance notices to ensure they comply with both CFA regulations and Mildura Rural City Council's Local Laws.



Penalty notices can be issued to landowners who do not carry out the required work.
