THE NAMING OF NICHOLS POINT

In 1849, a young man named John Nichols arrived Australia from England, on the ship named the "Coromandel", which docked in Holdfast Bay, South Australia.

Nichols Point was named after John Nichols, a horse ride

Between 1849 and 1852, John set out one morning to get rid of a wild built that was disrupting the local settlers' cows. He located the bull, and while on horseback, shot the bull which went to ground. John jumped off his horse, and to his amazement the bull got up and charged at his horse which took off leaving him stranded.

Mildura Station workers noticed that John's horse had returned without its rider, so a search party was sent out to locate him. He was eventually located, stranded up a tree with the wounded bull with horns [points] stamping and anorting around its base. The local settlers found the situation quite amazing, with one proclaiming, "Let's call her state the strands of the bull has had a win"."

John married Mary Middleton on February 20th, 1853 and raised 12 children and 2 grandchildren. The couple resided i Olive Avenue and Walnut Avenue in Mildura. They are buried in the Preshyterian Section at the Nichols Point Cemetery.



What's in a Name?

The tale of Nichols Points is one between a man, a bull, and a tree. A young man named John Henry Nichols sailed to Australia from England, finding work as an overseer, and meeting the love of his life, Mary, whom he married in 1853. John Henry was a diligent worker and one day while he was chasing some stray bulls on horseback, one of the bulls turned and charged at him. His horse panicked, throwing him off, but fortunately he landed just a few feet from a tree, which he quickly climbed to safety. He remained in the tree all afternoon and into the night to avoid the bull. The next morning, a search party found him still up in the tree. One of the searchers suggested naming the area Nichols Point, saying,

"let's call here Nichols Point, eh mates; the bull has had a win." The name stuck.

Following their deaths in March 1914 and December 1920, John Henry and Mary were buried in the Nichols Point Cemetery.

Moving through the years

Kings Billabong and local history enthusiast Marjorie Donnellan says a permanent population of hermits and fishermen settled in the area more than a century ago. But the first signs of modern settlement came in 1889 when pumping stations were built at Psyche Bend, Kings Billabong and Nichols Point as part of George and WB Chaffey's irrigation scheme of the region.

Two gorgeous little red brick homes stand side by side in Cooke Street Nichols Point and offer a glimpse into the area's early settlement days.

As the population of irrigators in Nichols Point increased, so did the need for services. A primary school was opened for 42 students in May 1892. Classes were initially held in a 'bough shelter' structure before the school moved into the Methodist Church in July of the same year. This site, on the corner of Fifth Street and Koorlong Avenue was used until 1907 when classes moved into a newly built brick building across the road. The Nichols Point post office opened in 1908.

"For thousands of years the Murray River wetland and floodplains we now know as King's Billabong and Nichols Point were bountiful and reliable source of life for indigenous people, who knew the area as Yerre Yerre."



What Our Community Looks Like

Nichols Point is a serene rural area primarily known for grape horticulture, a tradition fiercely protected by residents over the years. The community takes pride in preserving its rural character while embracing modern activities. Recently, there has been a notable increase in the number of residents and subdivision developments attracted to our rural lifestyle adding to the existing strong sense of community and a commitment to maintaining the balance between growth and preserving our unique heritage.

There are a number of places for congregation and community that are well established in Nichols Point. These businesses and community groups serve an integral role in keeping Nichols Point residents connected and shows the vibrant, healthy lifestyle enjoyed by all.

Nichols Point Primary School

Primary aged children have been attending school in the Nichols Point area since 1892, with the current site being opened in September 2007. The school strives to provide an environment that is engaging, safe and inclusive with excellent facilities in both the classrooms and in the playground. The classrooms are welcoming and comfortable spaces to learn, with modern technology and facilities, fantastic play equipment and sporting facilities, quiet areas, veggie patches, a chicken coop and lots of shady seating for the students to enjoy. The school's commitment to a 'kid's first' culture, which prioritises students in all decision-making, planning, and outcomes, has solidified its positive reputation within the broader community, making it a school of choice.

Nichols Point General Store

The Nichols Point General Store is the hub of the community, providing a variety of services to residents such as postal, giftware, groceries, catering, beverages, takeaway food, such as postal, giftware, groceries, catering, beverages and takeaway food. With strong ties to community, the store owners generously support sporting groups and community events, providing space for community information to be displayed and distributed.

Nichols Point Recreation Reserve

Nichols Point Recreation Reserve (NPRR) is located off Fifth Street and is own by Council freehold, with Council being responsible for most maintenance tasks and minor operation being carried out by local clubs (e.g. cricket wicket preparation is carried out by the cricket club). The NPRR is the home to and used by the Nichols Point Cricket Club, Nichols Point Soccer Club and Sunraysia Rugby League.

The Nichols Point Community Hall is also located at the NPRR and is well utilised by the Mildura Theatre Company and is available for community hire. The newly completed sporting pavilion featuring club rooms, kiosk, storerooms, change rooms and toilets is due to be completed in early 2025.

Nichols Point Scout Activity Centre

In 1895, the Mildura Irrigation Trust was set up by the government to ensure fair and equitable access to irrigation. The building on the corner of Cureton and Karadoc Avenue was the last of three pumping stations built to irrigate the old Mildura Irrigation District. In the 1960's the old pump station was purchased by the Scout Association of Australia – Victoria/Sunraysia Branch and is known today as the Nichols Point Scouts Activity Centre. The Sunraysia Scout District Scouts use the Centre



for training, activity days, campfires, meeting and rehearsals for Sunraysia Gang Show. The facilities are also used by Electric Light Theatre, Girl Guides and Sunraysia Radio Group. This dynamic activity centre is well loved and maintained by the efforts of our Scouting volunteers.

Sunraysia Equestrian Centre

The Sunraysia Equestrian Centre is located at 66 Racecourse Road, Nichols Point. This has been a hub for local equestrian clubs since 1986 when the pony club was relocated there from the old Aero Ovals precinct. At that time Mildura Rural City Council cleared areas to provide suitable riding surfaces, and later assisted with the location of a building for use as a clubroom. Since then, with the efforts of countless volunteers, the centre has continued to develop the facilities and has hosted many events which have attracted horse enthusiasts from across southern Australia.

As a result of the 2022 Murray River flood event, the Sunraysia Equestrian Centre grounds were subject to significant damage including the loss of buildings, infrastructure, and riding surfaces. The Sunraysia Equestrian Centre Board of Management continues to work in cooperation with Mildura Rural City Council to restore and improve the equestrian centre facilities for future generations.

Riverside Golf Club

The Riverside Golf Club is located on the banks of the Murray River and boasts 18 grass greens and watered fairways set amongst majestic river red gum and box trees. Riverside is home to abundant native bird life, particularly waterbirds that nest in the natural billabongs adjacent to the Murray River itself. Golf enthusiasts can hire golf carts and equipment, take advantage of the licenced clubhouse and golf shop, or stay in one of the holiday houses overlooking the fairways.

The Nichols Point Tennis Club is also located at this site and welcomes anyone interested in having a game.







Kings Billabong Park

The park is an ecological marvel and self-supporting ecosystem, of 20 square kilometres, that supports several wildlife species, including the endangered Broad-shelled turtle, and numerous waterbirds. Community members, visitors, and residents can engage in activities such as walking and cycling along the tracks, fishing from the platforms, canoeing, birdwatching, and camping. There are three trails to suit a variety of needs, a 200m loop, 3.5km loop and a 9.5km loop.

Woodsies Gem Shop

Woodsies Gem Shop is a family owned and operated business, one of Australia's largest gem and giftware complexes catering for the whole family. Its showroom boasts timeless jewellery, exquisite gemstones, beautiful carvings, gifts and more. Family attractions include Aladdin's Cave – a walk-through display of gemstones sourced internationally, a garden maze that covers nearly a hectare of land and the opportunity to see jewellery being manufactured. The Cave-Inn cafeteria is set in a tranquil setting where snacks and refreshments can be enjoyed.



Stories From Our Residents





Living in Nichols Point for over 50 years has been a truly enriching experience for me. Saving our Heritage - The Rotunda Project

The successful Heritage listing of the Rotunda at the Old Nichols Point Primary School site was a proud moment for residents advocating for its protection.

The History of the old Nichols Point School and Rotunda has been significantly researched in an attempt to register the location with Heritage Victoria.

Following requests to the Mildura Board of Advice from local parents, a school for forty-two students was established in 1892 in the Methodist Church at the irrigated farmland settlement of Nichols Point, east of Mildura. In 1906 the red brick Nichols Point State School was opened on the corner of Fifth and Koorlong Avenues.

In the early twentieth century, a campaign led by the Victorian Education Department was underway to update school buildings and grounds, including through the provision of shelter sheds. Shelter sheds were seen as an important part of school life, providing shelter from the elements and an additional, well ventilated, covered space to provide school

children with fresh air. In 1911 funds were sought for its completion and the verandah was added. Designed by Alexander Thomson, Shire Engineer from 1899-1919, the play pavilion, or shelter shed was described by Frank Tate, Director of Education 1902-1928, as 'the best I have seen in an Australian school', as recorded in the 1973 publication Vision and Realisation: A Centenary History of State Education in Victoria.

During a Department of Education visit to schools in the north of Victoria, possibly in 1913, it was reported that: 'the Ministerial party was delighted at the external surroundings of the Nichols Point school. Lawns, a rotunda, gorgeous flowers of tropical hues, grape vines, heavy with the tempting fruit; all make this school a temple of aesthetic usefulness.' [The Mildura Cultivator, 23 April 1913, p 9]. The pavilion was described as 'spacious and ornamental' in The Mildura Cultivator, 31 October 1914 and in that year the school won third prize in the school ground competition for its garden laid out in what was described as the 'architectural' style.

Following increased residential development at Nichols Point during the 1980's and 1990's, a new school was built in 2006 on an adjacent site on Koorlong Avenue, and the original school building was vacated.





Remaining in the ownership of the Victorian State Government, the old Nichols Point School and shelter shed/rotunda lay dormant on the site for close to 10 years. In early 2015, upon hearing that the Victorian Education Department intended to demolish both the old Nichols Point Primary School and Rotunda, a group of Nichols Point residents began their fight to save both locations. Already heritage listed at a local government level, the sites were not protected from State Government intervention. Community meetings, led by resident Mandy Gowty, gave opportunity for residents and parents of former students to voice their opinions and lobby for Victorian State heritage listing on the site.

In mid-2015, the lobby group requested the land and buildings be purchased by the Mildura Rural City Council from the State Government which would give local residents more scope to preserve the heritage.

By October 2015, after consultations with council and other stakeholders, the Department of Education and Training advised the old school building and rotunda would not be demolished. While the original application to Heritage Victoria in 2015 requesting that the former Nichols Point Primary School and Rotunda buildings was denied,

further investigation and assessment on the Rotunda would result in the shelter shed being granted inclusion in the Victorian Heritage List in June 2016.

Fast forward to 2022 and the old school site and rotunda is now owned by Mildura Rural City Council. The school building is protected by a local government heritage listing, and the Rotunda protected by inclusion on the State Heritage List. The shelter shed has had a makeover and was officially opened Saturday March 22, 2025. The site overall will house a new kindergarten and Early Years Hub, with funding secured from the Victorian Government and works to commence in 2025.

This long, hard fought battle has resulted in a positive outcome for the protection of heritage and history in Nichols Point. Spearheaded by Mandy Gowty, Jason Modica, Evette Turlan and other local residents, this advocacy also resulted in the formal establishment of Nichols Point Inc, a community-led committee that continues the fight for progress, advocacy and preservation of history in the Nichols Point community.



The Nichols Point Recreation Reserve serves as the main hub for community to come together. Whether that is for soccer training with the Nichols Point Soccer Club over the winter, or at training and competition days with the Nichols Point Cricket Club during the warm summer days.

Alongside these sporting groups, the Reserve has been a space for community to gather after the significant floods of 2023 and continues to be a place of fun for kids in the area – utilising the lush green oval and playground before and after school and over the weekends.

Our hope is that the new Sporting Pavilion will continue to support this coming together of community which is such an important aspect of living in Nichols Point.

The installation of the new Nichols Point Sporting Pavilion and ongoing management from the Nichols Point Pavilion Management Group (made up of community and sporting group representatives) in 2025 has been warmly welcomed by residents and interested parties in Nichols Point.

Female sporting members utilising the Nichols Point Recreation Reserve have been spending their time pre- and post-game changing into their uniforms in the small public toilets on site. The existing club rooms have not had the space or capacity to accommodate both male and female participants during soccer, rugby or cricket training and matches.

Members of the Nichols Point Cricket Club, Nichols Point Soccer Club, Football Federation Sunraysia, Sunraysia Cricket Association, Sunraysia Rugby League and Nichols Point Incorporated decided it was timely to lobby for change at the Reserve. During a consultative process in 2013, Mildura Rural City Council developed a concept plan for the facility and a reference group formed.

Members of the sporting groups along with Nichols Point Primary School and other community members worked with the then Victorian State MP Ali Cupper and Mildura Rural City Council, to put forward plans for a new, upgraded facility on site and, in May 2022, were successful in securing the full \$1.75 million dollars to fund the upgrade.

This \$2,030,164.00 project was funded through a partnership between the Victorian Government (Local Sport Infrastructure Fund), Mildura Rural City Council, Developer Contribution Plan Allocation, Nichols Point Community Groups and Cricket Victoria.



The Nichols Point Community Pavilion is a purposebuilt multi use facility that will not only provide adequate change room facilities for all members of the sporting groups, it will also offer umpire's change rooms, medical room, an office, a function space, toilets, kitchen/kiosk, bar facilities, and storage sheds.

This project shows another fantastic example of community coming together, identifying a need, and advocating for change.

Looking to the Future



Nichols Point Inc is a volunteer community group and progress association that advocates for the preservation of history and the continued and new establishment of services in the Nichols Point area. Our aim is to support local sporting and recreational groups, individual residents and businesses in any way they might need our advocacy support. Nichols Point Inc has lobbied local and state governments for funding, being successful in receiving grants to build the Sporting Pavilion at the Nichols Point Recreation Reserve and in granting Heritage Listing to the School Rotunda on the old Nichols Point Primary School site.

This community plan will serve as a roadmap for development not only of infrastructure but also community engagement over the next four years. Our community's values and aspirations to build a connected, future-forward looking community are set out in this plan and we have high hopes and expectations that over the coming four years, we can continue this positive momentum of opportunity in Nichols Point.

By 2029, our vision of Nichols Point includes a strong, vibrant, and connected community that comes together many times throughout the year at the Pavilion, the Kindergarten, the School and new places of interest.

Special events throughout the year will be celebrated by residents – Christmas cheer and congregation will show up in many forms during the holiday period.

Children will have access to new and exciting spaces where they can congregate outside of school, using safe and accessible paths to get to and from home.

Continuing preservation of our important history will remain steadfast and ongoing advocacy for community groups and others will remain central to our work.

We will continue to highlight and celebrate small and medium size businesses that are proud to operate in our community. Residential development will push us further in seeking infrastructure and new business opportunities to enhance business and services for our residents to make life a little less stressful and a bit more fun!

What is Community Planning?

Community planning is a process that involves the active participation of residents, Council and other stakeholders in the development and management of their local area. It aims to balance economic, social, and environmental needs to create sustainable, resilient, and vibrant communities. The goal is to identify and implement actions within a plan that enhance the quality of life for community members. This process typically involves several key elements.

Assessment and Research

This involves gathering data on the community's needs, resources, demographics, and existing conditions.

The lovely, peaceful hamlet of Nichols Point is located a short six kilometres from the Mildura city centre and includes water fronts of the Murray River and Kings Billabong. The area is a mixture of natural bushland and waterways, horticulture, residential and recreation spaces.

Public Engagement




