





Council Grants provide community boost

Council's Community Grants Program continues to provide local clubs and not-for-profit groups with much needed support.


In 2018, Council gave away more than half a million dollars to local groups, enabling them to continue their vital work.

Mildura Electric Light Theatre was one of the organisations selected for a grant and was able to buy a new portable stage, helping to increase safety to its members.

Thanks to a \$6000 grant, the Mildura Weir Parkrun is now up and running with locals able to access a free 5km timed run each Saturday morning.

The Mallee Root Festival, the Diwali Night Festival, the Merbein South Community Hall and the Sunraysia Farmers Market also benefited from Council's grants program.

The latest round of Community Grants close on 18 March 2019, with funding available for Recreation Development, Recreation Facilities Upgrade, Arts Development, Rural Access and Events Funding and Support. For more information go to www.mildura.vic.gov.au/Community/Grants



Register your pet by 10 April

Cats and dogs come in all shapes and sizes. There's energetic dogs, friendly felines, playful puppies and chilled out kitties.

But no matter what type of cat or dog you have, as an owner, it's your responsibility to have them microchipped and registered with Council and failure to abide by this law may result in penalties.

All pet registrations are due on Wednesday, 10 April 2019.

Registering your pet is also the best thing you can do to ensure it is returned safely if it gets out or ends up in the Animal Pound.

If your pet was registered last year you will receive a registration renewal notice in the mail. If you have a new pet or your address has changed, please contact Council on (03) 5018 8100 to arrange registration.





Stage 2 of Riverfront Redevelopment moving forward

We've moved a step closer to realising the second stage of our city's riverfront redevelopment after Councillors recently endorsed the latest masterplan for the precinct.

The masterplan focuses on a nine-hectare strip of land running adjacent to the Mildura rail line and Seventh Street, between Madden and Walnut Avenues.

It outlines proposed areas for both commercial and residential development, upgraded events spaces and a new Village Square in the vicinity of the Powerhouse precinct, which could incorporate a café and cultural centre among a raft of different uses.

The revised masterplan also highlights enhancements to Jaycee Park, new walkways and additional parking.

Part of Council's Mildura Future Ready advocacy and funding strategy, the masterplan for the second stage of the riverfront redevelopment will now act as a guide to where development should occur, as well as stimulate thinking on what could be possible.

CCTV camera project to increase public safety

Mildura's riverfront precinct and areas of the CBD are about to receive a public safety boost following the rollout of new CCTV cameras in coming months.

The new cameras will be installed at key locations along the riverfront and CBD to provide additional surveillance as well as act as a deterrent to potential criminal behaviour.

The project, which includes additional public lighting in the CBD, was made possible through a \$234,000 funding injection from the Victorian Government's Community Crime Prevention Program.

There will be 17 cameras installed in the vicinity of areas including Nowingi Place, the Riverfront Powerhouse, Langtree Avenue connection and the Mildura CBD.

Work has now been under way for several months, including earthworks, installation of conduit and poles to mount the cameras.

Once the cameras are operational, footage from the CCTV network will be monitored by Victoria Police and only accessible by authorised personnel.

Mini pens removed from Mildura Animal Pound in animal welfare push

We've introduced changes to the way animals can be left at the Mildura Animal Pound in an effort to ensure the welfare of lost or surrendered cats and dogs.

Up until recently, if you needed to leave a cat or dog at the pound outside of opening hours they could be left in mini pens.

While this may have been convenient for people, it unfortunately put these animals at greater risk of harm, particularly during the warmer months, when they could be left for hours exposed to the summer heat.

It also put cats and dogs at risk if they were placed in a mini pen with an existing medical condition.

These pens have now been removed to ensure animals are given the attention they deserve and receive immediate shelter, food, water and care.

If possible, it's best to drop off animals during Mildura Animal Pound opening hours, which are between 10am and 12pm and 2.30pm and 4pm weekdays, and between 8.30am and 9.30am Saturdays.

If you need to leave an animal outside of Mildura Animal Pound opening hours, you can either take care of the animal until the pound opens again, or if you come across a stray cat or dog, keep them with you and call us on (03) 5018 8100 and a Council representative will collect them.

These changes are in line with the practices of many other pounds and shelters throughout Victoria, as well as addressing one of the key recommendations of a recent audit of the Mildura Animal Pound by the Victorian Department of Jobs, Precincts and Regions.



Community spirit saves Merbein South Community Hall

Council is fortunate to have been part of a recent community success story that has seen the historic Merbein South Community Hall saved.

The hall was facing demolition in 2012 after the Merbein South School it shared a site with was closed down, however a group of determined members of the Merbein South Community Hall Committee refused to sit back and let this happen, banding together to save it.

Following a series of community meetings, the group approached Council to purchase the hall and the land on which it is located, with a view to making the hall a focal point for the community for decades to come.

After several years working with Council and negotiating with the Victorian Government, the hall and associated land was purchased and local residents have begun work readying the hall for community use.

The group was recently successful in applying for \$6000 through Council's Community Project Grants program which will be injected into new irrigation equipment as part of work to beautify the area surrounding the hall.

This is the second time Merbein South residents have jumped into action to save their hall. Residents took it upon themselves to relocate and restore the historic building in 2001, moving it from its previous location in River Road to the current site.

Once current works are completed to the hall and surrounds, which includes a fenced recreation area, tennis courts and toilets, the Merbein South Community Hall Committee plans to make the venue available for community events and other uses.

In support of White Ribbon

Council receives White Ribbon reaccreditation

Mildura Rural City Council will continue its pledge to stop violence against women after being reaccredited as a White Ribbon Workplace.

Council first gained White Ribbon accreditation on 31 March 2016, pledging to help prevent violence against women in and outside of the workplace.

The organisation's commitment to the initiative has seen it develop and implement a number of comprehensive policies and also hold a range of local events such as the well-attended White Ribbon Walk. One of the most important actions undertaken was the education of all staff on what constitutes family violence and how they can play a role in making a difference.

In order to qualify for reaccreditation Council demonstrated an impressive level of ongoing commitment to the initiative.

Two female staff members in management positions were even among the first 20 women in Victoria to become White Ribbon Advocates.

Reaccreditation means Council will continue being a White Ribbon Workplace for the next three years.
